SET your school up for safety excellence!





Comprehensive Security Audit

- · Improves overall safety program
- Underscores commitment to safety
- Establishes priorities for safety enhancements
- Guides allocation of resources
- Long-term safety planning





Approaches for Addressing a Security Audit

- Collaborative approach Core Team
- Prioritization
- Accountability
- Data-driven decision making
- Regular monitoring, tracking, & reporting
- Staff Expertise
- Master Facilities Plan





Standard Response Protocol (SRP) by the "I Love U Guys" Foundation



HOLD

SECURE

LOCKDOWN EVACUATE

SHELTER



WHY THE SRP?

- Engages the entire school community emphasizing that it's a collective effort.
- All their training materials can be accessed on their website at no cost.
- Allows for flexibility response may vary based on unique circumstances of each emergency.
- Trauma informed promotes a culture of safety.
- Reunification Component SRM.



IN AN EMERGENCY TAKE ACTION



HOLD! In your room or area. Clear the halls.

OCCUPANTS

Clear the hallways and remain in room or Close and lock door area until the "All Clear" is announced Account for occupants and staff Do business as usual

Do business as usual



SECURE! Get inside. Lock outside doors.

OCCUPANTS

Return inside Do business as usual

STAFF

Bring everyone indoors Lock outside doors Increase situational awareness Account for occupants and staff Do business as usual



LOCKDOWN! Locks, lights, out of sight.

OCCUPANTS

Move away from sight Maintain silence Do not open the door Prepare to evade or defend

STAFF

Lock interior doors

Turn out the lights Move away from sight Do not open the door Maintain silence

Account for occupants and staff Prepare to evade or defend



EVACUATE! (A location may be specified) **OCCUPANTS**

Evacuate to specified location Bring your phone Instructions may be provided about retaining or leaving belongings

STAFF

Lead evacuation to specified location Account for occupants and staff Notify if missing, extra or injured people



SHELTER! Hazard and safety strategy. **OCCUPANTS** STAFF

Use appropriate safety strategy for the hazard

Hazard Safety Strategy Seal the room Earthquake Drop, cover and hold Get to high ground

Evacuate to shelter area

Lead safety strategy Account for occupants and staff Notify if missing, extra or injured people



School Safety Drills

- Opportunity for education & training
 - Gradual exposure is a confidence builder
 - Train roles and responsibilities for facilities staff in a crisis
- Trauma-informed approach
 - Advance communication
 - Sensitivity to triggers
 - Supportive staff presence
 - Debriefing and processing
 - Feedback and improvement





Safety Tabletop Scenarios

- Format is based on the Idaho School Safety 10-Minute Tabletop Exercise.
- Keep scenarios straightforward.
- Focus on questions answerable within 10 minutes.
- Encourage safety awareness, learning, and growth as a team.
- Goal is to empower team members to make informed decisions and respond effectively.



Time: 9:38 a.m.

Day: Tuesday

Month: November

Temperature: 30 degrees

Weather: Cloudy

Scenario #1: As you exit your office, you notice an unfamiliar adult walking down the hallway without any staff identification, and there's no guest sticker visible. With just 4 minutes until the next passing period, you approach the person, but they dismiss your attempt to communicate and walk around the corner.

1. What actions are you taking?



Safety Tabletop Scenario

Time: 2:18 p.m. **Day:** Tuesday

Month: September

Temperature: 66 degrees

Weather: Cloudy School: Elementary

Scenario: 32 minutes before dismissal, you hear about a barricaded suicidal individual near the school, two blocks away. There's a strong police presence, unconfirmed reports of gunshots, and the subdivision entrance is blocked. Given the neighborhood setting, students walk to school, and parents arrive 15-20 minutes before dismissal.

1. What steps are you implementing?



Safety Tabletop Scenario

- Alert school administration
- Incident Command Structure (ICS)
- Personnel check
- Notify contractors on site
- Communication protocols with facilities staff
- Trained Roles and Responsibilities Safety Drills
- Secure areas
- Assist first responders
- Bus routes
- School Communications





Incident Debriefs

- Assess effectiveness
- Learn and improve
- Evaluate Decision-Making
- Support Emotional Well-being
- Prepare for Future Incidents
- Build Confidence
- Enhance Communication & Strengthen Relationships
- Keep it simple

What if it's about 10 minutes before 0 points the end of the school day and you see a person looking in the window of an exterior door and trying to enter (jiggling the door handle).

What would you do?

- O Nothing, it is probably a parent at the wrong door.
- O This is a busy time, wait until after dismissal to email the principal.
- Report it right away to a building administrator or supervisor for follow-up.



"What if Wednesdays"

- Let's try one! Scan the QR code, select an answer, then click 'View Score' for feedback.
- Collected data supports safety reminders at staff meetings and identifies training needs.
- Staff engagement has been exceptional, with team members actively contributing scenarios, reinforcing the message of collective safety responsibility.

Student Safety Engagement

- Admin explain the rationale behind safety measures.
- Students are encouraged to ask questions and seek clarity.
- Promote the message that safety is everyone's responsibility.
- Student advisors actively participate in the High School Safety Team.
- Acknowledge the significance of student voice in shaping safety practices.
- Classroom visits relationship building.
