WASBO Accounting Conference Legislative Update

March 17, 2022

Remainder of Legislative Session

- The Legislature is done for the session.
- Very few education bills still in play will become law.
- GOP passed some messaging bills that the Governor will veto.
- Our objective has been Sustain as little damage as possible. Regroup for next session.
- We're communicating with the Governor's office regarding vetoes.

<u>Selected Legislation – Passed Both Houses</u>

- AB 893/SB 833 Grants to support the teaching of dual enrollments courses in high school. SAA supports.
- AB 975/SB 1004 Substitute teacher permits issued by DPI. SAA supports.
- AB 611/SB 589 The Foundations of Reading Test licensure requirement. SAA supports.
- <u>AB 495/SB 484</u> Possession of firearm in vehicle on school grounds by permit holder. **SAA opposes.**
- AB 602/SB 585 Crime reporting bill, pro-voucher. SAA opposes.
- <u>AB 903/SB 860</u> Additional program reporting requirements for gifted and talented pupils. **SAA opposes.**
- <u>AB 995/SB1011</u> Parental opt-out from face covering requirements in school buildings and on school grounds; requiring schools to offer an in-person option. **SAA opposes.**

Bills Stopped

- AB 435/SB 431 Cursive writing mandate. SAA opposes.
- <u>AB 475/SB 448</u> Requires total interest/rate on referendum question. **SAA opposes.**
- AB 899/SB 841 One credit of personal finance literacy for graduation. SAA opposes.

Empowering Parents Education Reform Package – Passed Both Houses

- SAA opposes all of these bills.
- <u>AB 963/SB 962</u> Parent Rights. Rights reserved to a parent or guardian of a child.
- AB 965/SB 966 DPI Reports. Changes to the components, methods, and formulas used to publish school and school district accountability reports.
- <u>AB 966/SB 963</u> Reorganizing Milwaukee Schools. Reorganizing the Milwaukee Public School System into four to eight school districts and creating a Milwaukee Public Schools Redistricting and Implementation Commission.
- <u>AB 967/SB 965</u> Charter Schools. High-performing charter schools authorized by school boards.
- <u>AB 968/SB 964</u> Charter School Board. Creating a Charter School Authorizing Board and allowing the board to authorize independent charter schools.
- <u>AB 970/SB 974</u> Choice Income Limits. Eliminating income limits for parental choice programs; eliminating pupil participation limits for the statewide parental choice program; essentially a "voucher in every backpack".

2022 Election Preview

• We anticipate quite a few retirements in the Legislature.

- Retirements will drive significant change on Education Committees
- What will be the impact of redistricting?
- Education will be key issue in 2022 Wisconsin election.
- GOP agenda: Expand vouchers, empower parents, direct money to the classroom.
- Evers' veto is currently standing in the way of the GOP agenda.
- We anticipate GOP control of both houses following 2022 election.
- Stakes are enormous in the gubernatorial election.
- Does Court decision on maps take GOP veto-proof majorities out of play?

Outlook for the Next State Budget?

- Who is governor will have a huge impact on 2023-25 State Budget.
- Big Factors: Economic growth, rising inflation, impending fiscal cliff.
- GOP lawmakers have no appetite for additional spending.
- How will lawmakers address fiscal cliff + CPI?
- Even though we have a big state surplus, the next state budget with be very challenging.

Deteriorating Political Environment for Public Education

- Diminishing numbers/influence of pro-public education legislators.
- Privatization advocates are the 800lb. gorilla of education politics.
- For years, we have depended on a handful of moderate GOP senators.
- With Olsen's retirement, our moderate firewall is essentially gone.
- In 2002, Wis. per-pupil spending ranked 12th highest; 11% above national average.
- In 2019, Wis. per-pupil spending ranked 25th; 4.5% below national average.
- This may be the most difficult environment for public education ever in Wisconsin.
- It is unlikely to improve following the 2022 elections.
- In fact, depending on the election outcome, it may get worse.
