There are two different types of drills required by these statutes: 1) a set of drills that must be performed and reported on annually to the community fire department via a form supplied by DSPS, if and only if such a community fire department exists; and 2) a school violence event drill to be performed in accordance with the school safety plan which requires a brief written evaluation to be presented to the school board/governing body within 30 days and then also reported on annually to the Office of School Safety (in conjunction with the filing of the safety plan).
